THE TROPICAL AGRICULTURAL ASSOCIATION (UNITED KINGDOM) Objectives, Mission, Governance, Trustees and Membership

The Tropical Agricultural Association (TAA) is unique professional association of individuals, businesses and corporate bodies involved in sustainable agricultural development.

Mission. The Associations's mission is "To advance education, research and practice in agriculture for rural livelihoods and sustainable development".

Governance. The charity is administered in accordance with its constitution, adopted on 1 December 1988 (registration no 800663).

Appointment of Trustees. Trustees are elected or appointed at the Annual General Meeting. Although there is no formal induction programme or training, most trustees have served the charity for considerable time. It is the duty of the Trustees as a body to manage the affairs of the charity. The Trustees keep under review the major risks to which it may be exposed. The Trustees are supported by TAA's Executive Committee (ExCo), meeting quarterly, mainly in London.

Membership. The Association presently has 412 fully paid active members including 30 Institutional ones, the highest number of institutions to date. A further 71 individuals contribute through donation. During the year, 70 individuals and 6 new institutions joined TAA, demonstrating the value of TAA as a professional association.

Activities and Achievements

TAA's achievments during the past year have included:

- 1. Proposals for a new Strategy. Members were consulted by means of a number of group discussions followed by a survey questionnaire to assess attitudes and elicit new ideas for our future. The results were reviewed by ExCo at a strategy workshop, focusing on strengthening what TAA does best. Six Working Groups were established to cover:
 - Support to Overseas Branches,
 - Careers' Support for younger members,
 - Honours and Accreditation,
 - · Communications and Publicity,
 - Institutional Membership, and
 - Governance (including compliance with GDPR¹).

TAA's main role was confirmed as a charitable common interest group of persons and institutions, training young professionals through TAA's award scheme, and exchanging knowledge by networking at events, on-line and through the "Agriculture for Development" journal.

2. Networking and information exchange

UK Regional Branches. These continue to provide a varied and interesting programme for members in different regions in the UK:

- Southwest organised a number of meetings and seminars, including a tour of the Scilly Islands and a conference on "Rural Tourism" at the Royal Agriculture University (RAU) in Cirencester.
- East Anglia arranged a visit to Aponics Vertical Agriculture trials and, with Cambridge Global Food Security, an annual May seminar on 'Reducing Crop Waste';
- London and the South East activites included 'Curry Club Talks' on topical development issues, a
 visit to Reading Unversity's Cocoa Trials as well as strengthening links with the All Party
 Parliamentary Group on Agriculture amd Food for Development (APPG-A&FD);
- Scottish Branch arranged an informal meeting of members.

International Branches. Coordinators continue to act as points of contact in the Caribbean, India, South East Asia, the Pacific and Zambia. The Coordinator in Zambia collaborated with UK-based TAA members in setting up a diploma course on agriculture. The new Coordinator in India successfully promoted new links and new members. Consultations with Branch Coordinators led to plans for greater involvement by Branches.

Specialist working groups. The Land Husbandry group continues to be active at National and International Conservation Agriculture Farming events. A new discussion Forum was set up for farming in Malawi.

3. Communication

TAA's Journal - *Agriculture for Development.* This provides an important and popular service for members raising the Association's credibility and impact. The Journal's already high standard continues to improve with two 'open' editions and one special issue on "Women in Agriculture" being published during the year. This is available to members as both hard and electronic copy.

TAA's Website (www.taa.org.uk) continues to be a focus for communication with members, with "email alerts" on latest news, topical issues publications, job vacancies and events, distributed to members almost daily and creating positive feedback. A contract was agreed with a web developer to rebuild, modernise and improve the site to be launched in the second half of 2018. The Twitter account has been re-invigorated to further promote and share TAA's activities.

4. Professional development

TAA's Award Fund (TAAF): The TAAF committee continues to provide a valuable mentoring service for last year's 15 awardees. This year TAAF made 10 new awards to MSc students to enable them to conduct dissertation studies in developing countries. An autumn conference of past awardees is planned to share experiences. Awards have been funded by generous donations from TAA's annual contribution, individual TAA members and non-members, including £2,000 from the Agricola Fund.

Honours. The Award of 'Development Agriculturist of the Year' was made to CARE International-UK for their Lendwithcare programme, an innovative micro-finance scheme helping entrepreneurs in developing countries to lift themselves out of poverty. Dr Ajaz Khan received this on behalf of CARE. No awards were made for "Young Agriculturalist of the Year".

5. Evidence and advice for policy

TAA continues to support the All Party Parliamentary Group on Agriculure and Food Development (APPG-A&FD), which was originally established with support from TAA's institutional members. The convenor for L&SE maintains TAA's links with the APPG. This year's Ralph Melville Memorial Lecture on 'Game Chaning Agri-Tech Innovation for the Future Farm' was jointly held with the APPG at the Houses of Parliament.

Looking to next year

The Trustees, with the support of ExCo, aim to continue the range of activities in line with the proposed new strategy to be approved at the AGM in December 2018. These include:

- The next Southwest Branch annual conference at the RAU on the 18th October will focus on *Food Chain Linkages: Locavores, Preservation, Storage and Minimising Wastage.*
- The next Hugh Bunting Memorial lecture, will be held on 14th November with Reading University, covering 'Climate Risk Management in Sub-Saharan Agriculture'.
- The Annual General Meeting and Annual Reunion will be held in London on 11th December 2018 and will include presentations from TAAF awardees and the award of TAA Honours.
- It is hoped to continue holding annual Ralph Melville lectures jointly with the APPG-A&FD) at the Houses of Parliament.
- TAA's new website is expected to be launched in the second half of 2018.
- A specialist publisher will be contracted to assist with editing, printing and distributing the journal during 2018/19
- A revision of the Honours categories, to encourage participation by young people from developing countries next year.

The Trustees, in conjunction ExCo and members, will seek to implement the new strategy proposals to ensure that TAA continues to fulfill its mission and objectives, and increase membership from students and overseas.

<u>Acknowledegments</u>: The Trustees express their thanks for the support provided by ExCo, the TAAF Commttee, Convenors of the UK Regional Branches and Specialist Groups and the organisers of our International Branches. In addition, the Trustees also thank the many TAA members who have contributed ideas, supported the *Ag4Dev* Journal and participated in the Association's activities.

Financial Review

The charity had a deficit of receipts over payments for the year of £3,008 (2017: £5,242 surplus).

Reserves Policy

It is the trustee's policy to hold reserves of approximately twelve months expenses so that in the event of a significant drop in income the charity can maintain its current level of activities for a reasonable period until replacement funding is obtained. At the year end the charity held unrestricted cash fund of £32,442, which represents over 12 months unrestricted expenses.
